House Bill 1 – Build to Learn Act of 2020

House Bill 1, the Build to Learn Act of 2020, authorizes the Maryland Stadium Authority to issue bonds to finance the construction of Montgomery County Public School facilities.

The Montgomery County Chamber of Commerce advocates for strategic capital spending, a positive business climate, and balanced tax reform to further the success of our members and to affirm Maryland's place as relevant and competitive in the regional and global marketplace. The Montgomery County Public Schools are a primary economic driver in our county and quality education is a prerequisite to a skilled talent pool for employers. Accordingly, MCCC strongly supports this legislation.

School capital budgets are funded by state and local contributions. In Montgomery County, local funds are not enough to keep pace with unprecedented enrollments. State funding through existing formulas is no longer adequate for the needed construction projects. MCPS is consistently behind meeting school space needs, placing today's and tomorrow's students at a disadvantage at the very moment when businesses are counting on an educated and skilled talent pool to fill jobs that are created.

The solution lies in finding additional funding for this very real and acute need. The grant program would provide additional money from the state and be matched by local resources. This would give greater assurance that many of the shovel-ready projects in Montgomery County would receive the funding they need to move forward.

Montgomery County is an economic engine of the state. The quality educational system is a key feature of the county. When schools suffer, the chilling ripple effects will be felt throughout the economy. Conversely, the multiplier effect will be substantial if we are able to address the resource challenges of school construction. Some of the immediate benefits of the proposal include top ranked schools that attract businesses to our state, access to opportunity for all students, and a skilled talent pool for employers.

For the aforementioned reasons, the Chamber strongly supports HB1 and respectfully urges a favorable report.
