House Bill 333: Montgomery County - Alcoholic Beverages - Micro-Breweries and Farm Breweries MC 18-19

House Bill 333 expands the privileges of a brewery that holds a Class 7 micro-brewery license, Class 8 farm brewery license, or Class 7 limited beer wholesaler's license in Montgomery County.

The Maryland General Assembly has a tradition of having each County Delegation decide how to regulate alcoholic beverages within their County. This is the basis for the Montgomery County Department of Liquor Control. Statutes similar to the provisions of House Bill 333 already exist in Wicomico County law.

House Bill 333 makes Montgomery County more attractive to entrepreneurs and investors and consumers consistently express a desire to buy products that are produced locally. The evolution of the craft beer industry has brought manufacturing jobs back to local facilities due to the popularity of local craft beer. Consumers are shifting to buying locally manufactured craft beer, if they can find it. Furthermore, production and self- distribution caps inhibit the opportunity of local Montgomery County breweries to have large export markets in the District and Virginia.

For these reasons, we request an House Bill 333 be given a favorable report.
